# Other Information

- We photograph in front of the traditional blue background for the directory photos. At the time of viewing photos, we'll show families other background color options that they may choose from.
- Everyone will need to view their photographs in order to be in the directory. They'll choose the photo that will go into the directory, which is them giving us permission to publish their photo with their name underneath it in the directory. They'll also receive a free 8x10, and a spiral bound directory.
- Everyone must be 21 years of age or older to be photographed alone.
- There should only be 1 appointment made per household. Each household receives 1 free spiral bound directory, and 1 free 8x10 portrait.

# **Preparing Your Families for Photography**

Please allow 1 hour total for your portrait session and selection of your directory pose. Please be on time, and check in with the Host/Hostess. They will direct you to your photography location.

<u>Clothing</u>: Stay away from busy patterns, such as stripes, polka dots. Solid colors such as red, blue, orange, brown, purple, or other colors produce better contrasting photos. Choose a color theme that unifies the look of your family. Long sleeves are better for adults and focus attention on the face. Short sleeves are better for kids and infants. Wrinkled clothing does not photograph well.

<u>Hair</u>: Avoid haircuts within 48 hours of your portrait session. It is best to have any hair changes done 2 weeks prior. Try to avoid hairstyles with large or small uplifting curls which may let our background show through the hair.

<u>Make-up</u>: Apply make-up as you normally would for an evening out. Pay special attention to your eyes. (This is the focal point in a portrait.) An extra coat of mascara can help bring out your eyes. Bring lipstick and powder for touch ups. ChapStick works well for guys (it keeps lips from looking dry and cracked). The Portrait Café offers retouching to help with any complexion issues (scars, blemishes, facial lines, etc.) and can also whiten teeth.

<u>Glasses & Accessories</u>: If you wear glasses normally, please feel free to wear them in your portrait. Our photographers are trained to minimize any glare, and this way we photograph the "real you". Avoid large distracting accessories. Smaller jewelry items compliment your face.

Nails: If you wear nail polish, it is best to wear neutral colors so that they will match with what you are wearing.

<u>Posing For Your Images</u>: If you have any special requests, please let us know. We encourage you to have fun during your portrait session. Let the photographer work with the children to bring out their natural smiles.

Mission Work in Alaska – Serving with Love: During our mission trip to Alaska, our team was placed at a variety of work sites, each offering unique opportunities to serve, learn, and grow in faith. Here's a glimpse of the lessons they carried home:

Anchorage Community Pregnancy Center Youth helped with yardwork, landscaping, painting, & organizing supplies—including emptying & refilling a massive 60-foot shipping container. Audrina Burkholder reflected, "It really brought to my attention how much God can change your life in a good way."

<u>Downtown Hope Center</u> (soup kitchen, women's shelter, & homeless outreach) Teams prepared & handed out hundreds of lunches, served coffee & pastries, organized clothing donations, spent time talking with people in need.

<u>Covenant House</u> (shelter & support for youth facing homelessness & trafficking) Groups deep-cleaned rooms, organized art & gym spaces, painted decks & stairways, assembled furniture—helping create a safe & welcoming space. **Evan Moloney** reflected, "You are doing the Lord's work even in the smallest of tasks. I am so thankful I had the opportunity."

<u>Lutheran Social Services</u> Students helped at the food pantry, packaging &distributing fresh produce & groceries to families in need. They also supported the <u>Golden Connections Senior Picnic</u>, setting up, serving, & listening to stories from the elderly community. **Taylor Schmeling** said, "Helping spread kindness goes a long way."

<u>Family Promise</u> (supporting families experiencing homelessness) Work included yard projects, organizing, writing encouraging notes, & building a fence for their new location. **Hadlee Shipp** shared, "The Lord worked through me to help others."

<u>RAIS Farms</u> (supporting refugee families) Youth babysat children while parents worked, helped with farm chores.

<u>Local Churches</u> (Our Redeemer & Anchorage Lutheran) Teams painted, cleaned, & helped with maintenance projects, learning

Evan Moloney: It was uncomfortable & hard to see people in Alaska without a roof over their heads or a hot meal. Thanks be to the Lord that Covenant House is doing the work they are doing. I did yard work & deep cleaning, which was not demanding —but that's not what it's about. It's not about doing something strenuous; it's doing work to help take the load off someone. The staff at Covenant House work hard day in & day out to provide a safe environment for people without homes. They were so appreciative, & it made me realize that even the smallest tasks can sometimes mean as much as the big ones. These are good people who need our prayers & to know how much Jesus Christ loves them.

Evy Benjamin: I volunteered to hand out coffee & pastries at the Hope Center. That experience gave me a whole new perspective on the life that others live & how lucky I was to be in Alaska serving them. I knew that there were a lot of homeless people in Alaska, but working at that window gave me a new understanding. There were many who had no idea what they were doing because they were so addicted to substances that affected their brains & daily lives. This made me want to help them even more. Seeing those people pushed me to check on all the people in my life more often. I never want someone to resort to drugs when they have people around them who love & want to help at their best & worst times.

<u>Frederick Peters</u>: Handing out lunches to the homeless, you could visibly see the gratitude, even if they didn't verbalize it. <u>Hadlee Shipp</u>: My favorite moments on the worksites were the ones I shared with my friends, the people I helped, & especially the boring times when Elyn made it fun.

<u>Hailey Smith</u>: Serving others again by giving out food. Due to my work schedule, I haven't been able to volunteer back home, so this was my first time all summer.

<u>Joseph Cobb</u>: The way that the people we were helping thanked us.

<u>Jude Peters:</u> The people were so excited that we were repainting their church, & they helped take care of us. I learned the reason they are so nice is because they rely on each other. They are kind to help everyone get through the year together.

<u>Julia Cobb</u>: These worksites taught me how God is working in & with His people on earth. I feel grateful for this eye-opening experience. I got to know people who have lived a life completely separate from mine, yet I felt connected to them through a shared love & faith in Christ. It's fulfilling to help others physically & emotionally. The food we passed out meant less than the time we spent & the conversations we held with those in need.

Lexi Parker: When we were at the Hope Center handing out food, it was nice to give food to people in need.

<u>Maddie Reddinger</u>: Pastor Hoover would get us drinks from the coffee house. He also sang "Ballroom Blitz," which was pretty funny, and we got to climb the rock wall that was in the gym.

<u>Maddie Van Spankeren</u>: Lots of people who lived & worked at Covenant House thanked us for helping them. They were so thankful that we came just to help out.

<u>Norah Werling</u>: At the Hope Center we were handing lunch to the homeless women. This showed me how much God has blessed my life. I was thankful to be able to hand lunch to them & have conversations to brighten their day with the joy of the Lord.

<u>Paul Peters</u>: I have a great memory of building wooden lawn chairs with Cillian, Evan, and Pastor Hoover.

<u>Russell Peters</u>: I was in awe of the kindness that was shown to my group at Anchorage Lutheran Church because they provided food & water for us and were really nice every time we were there.

<u>Scarlett Gillingham</u>: The Lord showed me how grateful I am to be a part of this church, to have this opportunity to serve, & to show the love the Lord has given me through my work.

Taylor Schmeling: Most impactful was doing well as a team & seeing how our help impacted the people in Alaska.
